

Now we're in business!

Daw is Chairperson of the Roma Lonemay Women's savings group.

Before support from Australia through ALWS partner, Daw's family was like many others in Rakhine State – living in poverty, struggling due to a lack of basic education, and having limited economic knowledge.

Families tried to earn a living on little local farms, raising a few livestock and by weaving bamboo handicrafts, but Daw says:

"Due to political tension and the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, women's savings businesses are rarely able to operate regularly."

That's where your ALWS support using the new 5:1 Australian Government Grant is critical.

Already there is exciting progress.

Our ALWS partner started working with 8 communities in this region in 2020, and despite all the challenges has increased this to 36 partner communities now.

These partner communities have 45 Self-Reliance Women's Savings Groups, like the one Daw leads. Nearly 600 women are benefiting from practical and technical training on how to increase family income through small businesses.

In Daw's group, the women used their training to work hard and save hard until together their group had a base of nearly \$10,000 AUD.

Now, they are in business!

"We are planning to open a traditional clothes-weaving business.


We have a cashew nut products business which is group-owned. There is also a liquid soap shop running in the township.

"I believe we will become a strong and reliable regional women's group very soon, because we can use the knowledge and techniques gained from the empowerment training.

"Moreover, strong participation and interest in us from several other women's groups across the township is a key point to upgrade the group quality as well."

This is grassroots, hands-on work at a local community level. Over the 15 years our partner has worked in Myanmar, trust has been won – both from the people, and from the authorities.

While the work now needs to be low-key and happen 'quietly', your 5:1 donation can effectively empower women to lead the way in building businesses to support their families! Daw Thein Kywel is proof, as you can see in her smile!



"This trouble of ours ..."

Their home is a one room hut in a Displaced Persons Camp. Their family just Dad and daughter Mya Mya. Their future "downcast".

This is why your 5:1 donation to support children to go to school is so precious.

"Now I am living together with my child who has a disability in the one room of shelter, having experience in hunger, feeling downcast and wanting to give up on everything.

We do not have any property. We just live with the support of the aid agencies.

Sometimes we have nothing to eat. Sometimes only rice and water. We do not have money to get the materials we need.



I am so sorry for my child because I cannot support what she needs for clothes, schooling, recreation and any events.

I am most worried about my child's education because she has a physical disability. The left eye cannot see clearly. She cannot see everything like normal, sometimes even in the daytime. She cannot even care for her hygiene by herself.


I usually help her to travel from home to school. Sometimes the teachers or PTA help.

I would like to get support such as some money to see the doctor for my child's health, and to buy materials that my daughter needs. A good shelter for my daughter and me. Clothes for her. Livelihoods support for me.

It would be my greatest happiness if we got this kind of help.

My daughter will be happy if I can support her health and basic needs. If the donor who can help us stands here right now, it must be the most satisfying thing for me.

I really want a person who can help me with this trouble of ours."

MYANMAR CYCLONE CRISIS

Thanks to people like you, ALWS provided \$100,000 for emergency aid through our local Myanmar partner. On Sunday 14 May, Cyclone Mocha devastated Rakhine State in Myanmar, where you work through ALWS.

Many of the Rohingya people you help in Displaced Persons Camps lost everything.



A priority was replacing household essentials that were washed away.



Through ALWS, you join in the rebuilding effort > by supplying tarpaulins and solar lamps.

You also support Cash-for-Work programs, providing income for displaced families as they are paid to rebuild damaged infrastructure – around \$6 per day for unskilled labour.


